Friends of Richfield Heritage Preserve

In 2023, the Friends of RHP established an endowment fund with the Akron Community Foundation (ACF) as a way to ensure a permanent, predictable stream of funding for its mission. The Friends invited ACF's development team for an autumn field trip to the park. Margaret Medzie, ACF vice president and CEO at that time, and six of her team members toured several historic homes and Kirby's Mill.



Park Director John Piepsny joined part of the tour and was enthusiastic as he showed off the nearly finished Amity House renovation. In collaboration with the Richfield Joint Recreation District, the Friends' Historic Home Stabilization Task Force (consisting of 13 skilled volunteers) is restoring Amity -- thanks in large part to funds raised through Friends' donors.

In North House, ACF members were amazed at the living room framed with timbers to resemble an inverted ship's hull. Amity and North Houses were also integral to Girl Scout Camp Crowell-Hilaka, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The group hiked the Buckeye Trail, enjoying the park's natural areas. Lunch was shared on the Kirby House veranda, where original windows frame a view of the Lower Lake and Kirby's Mill.

The Friends were awarded a \$5,000 grant from ACF's William Wallace Fund to use for their operational expenses. Thank you to ACF for touring the park to help them understand how these

historical and natural resources need to be conserved and utilized to the fullest extent possible by the community – and by future generations.
